The cost to host the two regional trail celebration events has involved existing staff resources to organize the event, with minimal expense related to materials and supplies as well as event advertising which will be covered under the existing regional parks operations budget.

#### Background:

On Thursday June 9<sup>th</sup> the first of two Cowichan Valley Trail Celebration events took place at the Greendale Road Trailhead in the Town of Lake Cowichan. Over sixty people attended the celebration including members of the local Cowichan Lake Retreads hiking club, members of Trails BC attending their annual AGM held in Duncan this year, and representatives from Trans Canada Trail, Island Coastal Economic Trust, Island Corridor Foundation and the Town of Lake Cowichan Council. The event included recognition of project funding sponsors and ribbon cutting, with coverage by the local media (see attachment).

The second Cowichan Valley Trail Celebration event is scheduled for Thursday July 14<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 a.m. at the Chemainus Train Station in Chemainus. Invitations have been sent to project funders and supporters as well as ads in the local papers inviting the public to come out and celebrate the completion of sections of the new trail between Duncan/North Cowichan and Chemainus. A copy of the ad is running in the local papers and on the CVRD's website (see attached). The local media is also invited to this event. Events such as these assist with promoting new parks and trails managed by the Regional District.

# Walkers and hikers celebrate official opening of Cowichan Lake link

The Warm Land's ever-widening web of hiking and biking trails now officially includes a 26-kilometre stretch between North Cowichan and Lake Cowichan.

That gravel span — banning motorized vehicles such as ATVs and dirt bikes — of the Cowichan Valley Trail system was officially opened last week.

It runs between Lake Cow's Greendale Road and North Cowichan's Sherman Road.

"It's our section of Cowichan Valley Trail which is part of the Trans-Canada Trail," said Ryan Dias, parks superintendent with the Cowichan Valley Regional District.

He noted a separate trail, linking Chemainus Road and Elm Street, is now completed and due for official opening next month.

Also, the goal of the northern completion route is to eventually hook North Cowichan's trails to those in the Regional District of Nanaimo, Dais explained.

Meanwhile, he was stoked about the new path to Lake Cowichan that also welcomes horse riders.

It was built during the past  $1\,1/2$  years using more than \$1 million from taxpayers, plus various corporate contributions.

Ottawa chipped in some \$400,000 through the Trans-Canada Trail Foundation.

That money helped resurface the former E&N rail line along the three-metre, 26-km route.

About \$620,000 in provincial cash also arrived via the Island Coastal Economic Trust.

Money well spent in the view of Duncan mom Christy McClelland who walked the trail last week with friends and toddlers.

"Thank-you to all bodies of government and council and leadership in this community, and all the workers and companies that laboured to make such an amazing oasis of quiet and safety, right in my backyard," she wrote the Leader.

"We were able to walk three wide and chit-chat, allow our walking kids to get out and run, and actually hear one another talk — all things that are clearly not options while walking on a sidewalk along a loud and busy road."

Dias was also happy with the eco-project.

"There are two major bridge crossings across Averill and Holmes creeks," he said.

"This trail also goes through various ecosystems, such as beaver dam areas."

Natural features also include patches of wild ginger and other sensitive plant species.

Signage appears at every road crossing and there are trailhead maps in North Cow and Lake Cow.

Planned signage includes interpretive signage at points of interest, plus distance markers along the route covering Teleglobe's buried fibre-optic cables.

Telus corporation poured \$200,000 into the trail's drainage-culvert replacement.

"It's really a nature experience," summed Dias.

But that experience will spell fines for folks caught using motorized rigs, or hunting, on the trail.

"There'll be active bylaw enforcement with random site visits during the day, evenings and weekends, with support from the police."

#### Background:

The Catalyst Paper waterline route was constructed in 2010 under the recent Cowichan Valley Trail Grant funding initiatives, with one small portion planned for construction in 2011 in order to complete the connection to the Cowichan Exhibition Grounds. The current sections of waterline route that are open for public use are operated under a one year Trail License Agreement with Catalyst Paper. which is set to expire on July 31, 2011.

In order to continue to operate the waterline route as a public trail, a renewal trail license with Catalyst for use of the existing and to-be-constructed sections of the waterline route for a public trail is required. The terms and conditions of the Use Agreement are proposed to be the same as currently in place, including the current fee structure, which would see the CVRD charged an annual rent cost equivalent to the portion of property taxes that are due on sections of the Catalyst waterline property used for the trail for each year of the license term.

#### Background:

The Electoral Area Services Committee meeting of June 21, 2011, referred the following from the Electoral Area E Parks and Recreation Commission to the Parks Committee;

"It was noted at the meeting that the Tansor Service Station has indicated that they have had to close their washrooms since they were being inundated by users of the Trans Canada Trail (Cowichan Valley Trail). Their washrooms are on a septic tank/field system and cannot accommodate trail users and the owner has suggested that there is an immediate need for washroom facilities constructed at key locations along the trail. It was also noted at the meeting that more and more garbage is showing up along the trail and some garbage cans are needed."

The Parks and Trails Division continues to monitor the level of use on the Cowichan Valley Trail, including new sections recently opened over the past year. In locations are noted with continued excessive garbage, the response plan has been to install a garbage receptacle where appropriate and serviceable. Similarly, key entry points to the trail are being assessed to determine capacity and demand to install toilet surrounds for seasonal/year-round porta-potties for trail users. As servicing of garbage cans and porta-potties both have cost implications, the approach to determining such requirements has been based on monitoring the overall trail use to gauge the level of demand/need. The feedback from the Electoral Area E Parks Commission is appreciated by the Parks and Trails Division.

The Tansor Road Trailhead is currently undergoing a planned upgrade which includes a twelve (12) car gravel parking area, porta-pottie surround, trailhead information kiosk and garbage receptacle. These works should be completed in the next couple of weeks.

Osborne Bay Regional Park - Hay Cutting Permit

#### Recommendation/Action:

That the Board Chair and Corporate Secretary be authorized to execute the necessary legal agreement documents as required to enter into an agreement with Chris Vale for Hay cutting at designated areas within the west side of Osborne Bay Regional Park for a maximum five year term.

## Relation to the Corporate Strategic Plan:

## Financial Impact:

#### Background:

As part of the overall maintenance program for Osborne Bay Regional Park, the south west portion of the regional park has been cut annually for hay by a local farmer, Chris Vale, who lives adjacent to the park. For the past several years, the CVRD has held an annual permit with Mr. Vale allowing him to cut the hay at no cost to the Regional District, which provides for both invasive species management and controlling fire risk potential within the regional park. This mutually beneficial arrangement continues to occur at this time under a 1 year operating agreement set to expire July 31, 2011.

These open field areas that receive annual hay cutting have also been subject to vandalism in recent years. Due to the open nature of the access on the west side of the regional park, and the lack of controlled accessibility, vehicles are able to enter the field area with ease, leaving behind damage in the form of large ruts, holes and disturbed vegetation.

As a longer term strategy to control both vandalism and maintenance of the west side of Osborne Bay Regional Park, Mr. Vale has offered to erect a page wire fence and three farm gates along the entire park property line that fronts Smith Road at no cost to the Regional District. This would secure the property line, making it impossible for vehicle traffic to enter the park, and provide much needed security for long term protection of the park. The proposed value of Mr. Vale's investment would be approximately \$10,000. In exchange, Mr. Vale has requested a five year hay cutting agreement with the CVRD so that his investment in site security is justified. The fence would become property of the CVRD after two years, and maintained by Mr. Vale for the duration of the five-year agreement term.

Terms of the five year haying agreement would be as follows:

- Maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$2,000,000, and shall include the Cowichan Valley Regional District as an additional insured
- Will only cut hay on the southwest portion of Osborne Bay Regional Park
- Will leave the land in good condition after the hay cutting
- Will observe all fire regulations and restrictions during the period of this agreement
- Will not carry on any works or activity on the land that shall be deemed by the CVRD to be a nuisance
- Will agree to observe all legal requirements during the term of the agreement
- Will give up possession of the land at the end of the agreement term

The CVRD will also have the capacity to terminate the agreement upon written notice if the terms of the agreement are not complied with. The surrounding natural habitat and environs will be protected as deemed appropriate by the CVRD.

## We're about to become a world-class destination for trails fans

If you haven't noticed, trails are in. Big time.

Not just the Cowichan Valley's section of the Trans Canada and Cowichan Valley Trails (the former Canadian National and E&N Railway grades), but miles of new and scenic pathways courtesy of Duncan and North Cowichan.

For its part, the CVRD has upgraded the CV Trail with handsome entry points on Sherman Road, at Glenora and at Lake Cowichan, a first class bridge over Holmes Creek and miles of crushed gravel from that point west to Greendale Road.

All that and the Kinsol Trestle is nearing completion.

Which has been one of the more intriguing points of the whole exercise, for me. Seldom have I seen all levels of government — municipal, regional, provincial and federal — on the same page in such a proactive way. The funding of the Kinsol is a prime example of this multi-governmental approach to outdoor recreation and what has been termed, heritage tourism.

For those of us who are so blessed as to live in the Cowichan Valley, the result is miles and miles of outstanding hiking, cycling and equestrian opportunities, year-round. Talk about our tax dollars at work!

Last Thursday, a ribbon-cutting ceremony (the cupcakes were delicious) at Lake Cowichan marked completion of the CV Trail's make-over. On Friday, the annual general meeting of Trails B.C. was held at the Quw'utsun' Cultural and Conference Centre. Among those attending from around the province were Gerry Giles, CVRD chair person, Brian Farquhar, CVRD parks manager, Deborah Apps, CEO and president, Trans Canada Trail, and representatives from the provincial Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resources, the Capital and Nanaimo Regional Districts, and VISTA, the volunteer group which for several years has been working towards the establishment of the Vancouver Island Spine Trail.

Their project should be of particular interest to Valley residents as it's the natural extension of the Valley's Trans Canada Trail (which, at present, effectively ends at Lake Cowichan) to Port Alberni by following the same historic Canadian Pacific Northern (CNR) Railway grade that never made it beyond Kissinger, at the head of Cowichan Lake. Ultimately, the completed trails system will begin at Swartz Bay via the Lochsyde and Galloping Goose trails, and go overland for 400 miles, much of it through wilderness, to Cape Scott!

This would be nothing less than a world-class destination trail, one that is sure to draw visitors from all over. Visitors who pass through will, hopefully, do it at a leisurely pace. Meaning trade for local businesses, jobs for local citizens. If this isn't an example of win, win — what is?

The many accomplishments of Trans Canada Trails, Trails B.C. and VISTA are prime examples of what can happen when private citizens with vision and drive work together. Yes, as I noted, much of the funding for these trails has come from various government levels. But much, too, has come from public donations from people who saw the value in these projects long before governments, some of them quite reluctantly, came to the table. To this day, even with the recognition of trails by officialdom, private individuals continue to lead the charge.

For example, we in Cowichan don't have the only saved railway bridge. Last April, Princeton area's metal Bridge of Dreams over the Tulameen River was reopened to recreational traffic. Built in 1915 as part of the Kettle Valley Railway and later deconstructed but for its concrete piers, it has been returned to service for recreational traffic. Much of the credit for the bridge's reconstruction goes to volunteers of the Vermilion Trail Society who chased down almost a million dollars in grants.

To put all this in context, let's take a quick look at the Trans Canada Trail which, in reality, isn't a single trail but a system of 400 trails "from coast to coast to coast." By 2017, Canada's 150th anniversary and the 25th year of the TCT, the goal is to complete the missing dots across Canada. At 22,500 kilometres from the Atlantic to the Pacific to the Arctic

Oceans, it'll be the longest "trail" in the world. Given Canada's mixed terrain and climate, this is a daunting challenge to say the least but one that is already well underway.


The work goes steadily on and we in the Cowichan Valley can certainly be said to have done our share with the extensive conversion to trails of our former railway lines, the building of new ones, and the rehabilitation of the Kinsol Trestle.

Speaking of which, for those readers who'd like to have a magazine cover worthy of framing, check out the current issue of CN Lines, available at the Cowichan Valley Museum gift shop.

Taken by the late and great railway photographer David Wilkie, it shows a steam locomotive pulling a load of logs across the Kinsol. The accompanying article on the trestle's rebuilding, by Victoria's well-known railway historian Bob Turner, has several other excellent photos, including the late Elwood White's iconic shot of the only passenger train ever to cross the Kinsol. It's worth every penny of the \$8 sales price!

be joined by curbside pickup of organic waste such as bones and other greasy stuff.

Cowichan recycles most wastes now - outside of plate glass, building materials such as cinder bricks, plus plumbing fixtures such as toilets — as McDonald plans more programs.

"They're just a twinkle in my eye right now," he said.

He's also eager for Cowichan's Economic Development Commission to generate future jobs by growing businesses here to process recyclables:

Trail blazers: CVRD eyes on the path with tickets in hand

VRD bylaw enforcement officers could be hot on your trail not only weekdays but also nights and weekends too, if you're travelling the links of the Cowichan Valley Trail and are committing one of several trail faux pas.

There's a misconception out there that we don't work nights and weekends and we do," CVRD manager of inspection and enforcement Brian Duncan said.

The newest portion of the CVT, the waterline route through the Municipality of North Cowichan, is hot off the press and like with any new feature, folks have to be reminded of the rules, Duncan said.

That's why the CVRD is warning trail users that starting Canada Day long weekend, they're upping enforcement along all 122-clicks of the CVT.

The CVT spans routes from the south. end of Shawnigan Lake to the Town of Lake Cowichan following the grade of the former CN railway line.

The trail continues from the Town of Lake Cowichan to Sherman Road following the former E&N rail grade.

"We've got 40 random patrols lined up over the summer period and we've got seven bylaw enforcement officers on staff here at the CVRD," Duncan said.

"We've got two parks staff who usually double up with the bylaw officers to do bike patrols, and they'll park their jeeps at the trailheads with signs saying trail enforcement; and walk the trails.

"And the guys are clearly identifiable with bylaw enforcement vests on too."

Duncan couldn't give a dollar figure on summer patrols, but did say they're scrounging as much as they can in house to watchdog the trail.

They're also keeping the local Mounties in the loop.

"They're starting their bike patrols this weekend and they're going to be involved with us," Duncan said of North Cowichan/Duncan RCMP officers.

CVRD staffers will communicate to the cops the more "tougher, troubled," parts.

As part of their regular enforcement, they'll ride through some of these problem areas."

Duncan identified the chunk along what's known as the old Chinese cemetery in the Sahtlam area, as well as the Bings Creek Bridge portion, is the two areas most frequented by motorized vehicle users.

Ouad and motorbike riders aren't welcome on the trail.

"There are a lot of people jumping on their ATVs and taking shortcuts on the trail to get where they're going and not having a lot of regard for the people that are having to move out of the way," he

Other no-nos include people letting their pooches off leash, not cleaning up their dog's doo doo, dumping garbage down the sides of the trail and cutting down trees along the side of the trail.
"We're just trying to stop all of that. We

just want to make the trail safe and clean and enjoyable for everybody.

"There are a select few that are bound and determined not to allow that."

The majority of users who slip up with the rules will be issued warnings, but repeat offenders can face charges ranging from \$50 to \$250.

"We re thinking of increasing those fines too," Duncan said, "Maybe.
