SUBJECT: Transit Business Plan – Service Options for 2009

## Recommendations:

- That the CVRD proceed with the implementation of Route 5 Eagle Heights Cowichan 1 Commons, effective September, 2009; subject to funding from BC Transit.
- That the CVRD proceed with the introduction of a Community Bus Route serving 2. Cowichan Station and other rural areas south of the Cowichan River, effective September 2009; subject to funding from BC Transit.

## Purpose:

To determine the service option(s) for expansion in the 2009/2010 BC Transit fiscal year.

## Financial Implications:

Dependent on service option(s) chosen for 2009/2010.

## Background:

In 2005, the CVRD Board of Directors adopted a five year Cowichan Valley Transit Business Since that time, the Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System has undertaken the following enhancements:

- Conventional bus service introduced to Crofton and Chemainus;
- Service extended to the Crofton and Chemainus Ferry Terminals;
- Sunday and Statutory Holiday Service added;
- Transit service extended to Gordon Bay Provincial Park;
- HandyDART expanded from serving only North Cowichan and Duncan residents to providing service in Electoral Areas A, B, C, D, E, F, I and the Town of Lake Cowichan;
- HandyDART added a second bus in order to serve the larger geographic area;
- Route #2 Mt. Prevost extended to the new Cowichan Commons shopping centre;

- Additional 2,400 hours of service added to the South Cowichan area;
- Bus service extended to the Mill Bay Ferry Terminal;
- Cowichan Station/Sahtlam/Glenora joined as a new funding partner;
- Introduction of the Cowichan Valley Commuter service to downtown Victoria.

The Business Plan identified the following Medium Range Service Options (2006-10) which have not yet been undertaken:

- Improved Frequency on Route #2 Mt. Prevost and Route #3 Quamichan;
- Improved Frequency to Lake Cowichan;
- Ladysmith Service;
- Introduction of Taxi Supplement.

The following new items were added by the Transit Committee to the Business Plan in 2008 but have not yet been undertaken:

- Cowichan Commons Shoppers Express, Service Introduction to Eagle Heights (Area E);
- Community Bus Expansion to Growth Regions south of Duncan;

There is no implied order of priority for the options listed above. Since priorities can change over time, the plan was drafted to be flexible. However, it is time to consider which option(s) to include in the 2009/2010 BC Transit fiscal year (April 1, 2009 to March 31, 2010). It is important to implement the service options that have been identified in the Transit Business Plan since continued enhancement of the system leads to growth and increased ridership for the transit system.

According to BC Transit, annual ridership on the Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System rose from 291,671 passengers in 2006/07 to 322,680 passengers in 2007/08.

## 2009/2010 Recommended Expansions

Electoral Area E – Cowichan Station/Sahtlam/Glenora officially became a transit funding partner as of September 30, 2008. As a result, property owners in Electoral Area are now paying taxes for transit service in 2009. Therefore, staff are recommending that the only expansions in 2009 be those that provide service to Electoral Area E and adjacent areas.

## Priority #1:

Cowichan Commons Shoppers Express, Service Introduction to Eagle Heights (Area E).

As approved by the Transit Committee in July 2008, this new route will provide service between the Eagle Heights residential neighbourhood; the Area E Industrial Park; downtown Duncan; the Island Savings Centre and the Cowichan Commons. This service would operate on an hourly basis Monday through Saturday with a limited schedule on Sundays.

Operating as Route #5, this route will serve the highest density population area of Electoral Area E; the employees working in the Industrial Park; the users of the Island Savings Centre,

Cowichan Aquatic Centre (and in the near future, Vancouver Island University); and also provide a frequent shuttle between two core shopping areas (Downtown Duncan and the Cowichan Commons). This frequent service will also greatly benefit riders transferring from bus routes arriving from other parts of the region. It will provide transportation options for users riding in the central core of the Cowichan Valley.

It is estimated that this service will generate additional ridership of 66,000 riders. The net CVRD cost of this service is estimated at \$55,000. If implemented in September 2009, the prorated net CVRD cost would be \$18,333.

## Priority #2:

## Community Bus Expansion to Growth Regions south of Duncan

Approved by the Transit Committee in July, 2008, this new route would serve the sparsely populated areas located south of Duncan that aren't currently served by existing routes. Usually small accessible minibuses (similar to handyDART vehicles), this route would have a fixed schedule with the flexibility to divert slightly off route. Service would be approximately every 60 minutes Monday through Friday. Cowichan Station would form the centre of this new service. A petition has been received from the Sunrise Waldorf School (which serves Kindergarten to Grade 8 students) indicating that many students will use the service in the morning and afternoon school rushes between Duncan and the School.

In order to boost potential ridership in this sparsely populated area, it has been suggested that this Community Bus could be extended to the eastern side of the Trans-Canada highway to service areas such as Cherry Point Road, Telegraph Road, Satellite Park and Arbutus Ridge.

It is estimated that this service will generate additional ridership of 20,000 riders. The net CVRD cost of this service is estimated at \$51,000. If implemented in September 2009, the prorated net CVRD cost would be \$17,000.

## 2010/2011 Recommended Expansions

In the final year of the Business Plan, it is suggested that the following expansions take place in September 2010:

- Improved Frequency on Route #2 Mt. Prevost and Route #3 Quamichan;
- Improved Frequency to Lake Cowichan.

Further consideration of these two expansions (along with updated cost estimates) will be brought forward to the November 12, 2009 Transit Committee meeting.

As for the potential expansion of CVRD bus service into Ladysmith, the Town has been investigating other transit options in their community including operating their own trolley system (similar to the Langford Trolley). To date, no formal request has been received from

Ladysmith to join the CVRD transit system. Expansion to Ladysmith was scheduled in the 2008 placed in the 2008/09 BC Transit fiscal year, but provincial funding for this expansion was not approved.

Until such time that Ladysmith formally requests joining the Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System, it is suggested the other proposed improvements to the system occur first. Expansion to Ladysmith can be considered in the next five year update of the Business Plan (2010-2015).

#### Recommendation #1:

## Introduction of service to Eagle Heights (Area E) - Cowichan Commons Shoppers Express. Description:

The proposal introduces regular conventional transit service to Area E region immediately south of Duncan and west of Hwy 1. This proposal also greatly improves service frequency to the new regional shopping complex, Cowichan Commons.

## This proposal includes:

- One additional bus added to the fleet linking the Eagle Heights residential neighbourhood with key activity centres including Downtown Duncan and Cowichan Commons (see Map 1). The new route, #5 Cowichan Commons will start at Village Green Mall, travel south via Hwy 1 to Eagle Heights then back to Downtown. The route will then travel north direct via Hwy 1 to Cowichan Commons providing a regular express link between the major shopping regions.
- Frequency on the new #5 Cowichan Commons will be every 60 minutes, Monday through Saturday with a limited schedule on Sundays.
- The operating schedule will be designed to alternate with the current Cowichan Commons routes (#2 Mt. Prevost and #3 Quamichan) to provide a regular 30 minute service between Downtown Duncan and Cowichan Commons.
- Minor route adjustments will also be made to the #2 Mt. Prevost and #3 Quamichan to enhance service coverage to Cowichan Commons and areas north of Sherman Rd.

#### Key Markets Served:

• Shoppers, youth, seniors and BC Bus Pass holders. There is also potential for student and commuter markets.

### Key Benefits:

- Improved frequency to Cowichan Commons linking Downtown with Cowichan Commons, resulting in improved travel options to key shopping destinations.
- · Introduces service to new growth areas well outside conventional service walk limits.
- Provides a link for Eagle Heights passengers traveling to all regions within the Cowichan Valley Transit System.
  - · Improved ridership and transit awareness.
  - Provides a much improved viable option to the private car.



## Recommendation #2: Community Bus Expansion to Growth Regions South of Duncan (Area E)

**Description:** This proposal introduces Community Bus service to residential growth areas not currently served by conventional transit. Community Bus service provides a blended service meeting all client needs. Service is provided by small accessible minibuses (similar to handyDART vehicles) that provide a fixed schedule together with flexibility to divert slightly off route. Service would be approximately every 60 minutes Monday through Friday. Rural and growth regions are primarily focused on the Cowichan Station area, Bench Road, Koksilah Road, Riverside Road and Lakeside Road.

In addition, if warranted, services could be extended to the eastern side of the Trans Canada highway to service areas such as Telegraph Road, Aros Road and Cherry Point Road.



SUBJECT: 2009 Free Transit Days

## Recommendation:

That it be recommended to the Board that:

- 1. Cash fares on the local Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System be reduced to zero (no charge) on Wednesday June 3, 2009 in support of Clean Air Day and on Friday December 18, 2009 to celebrate the holiday season.
- 2. That free transit be offered to veterans on Remembrance Day November 11, 2009.

## Purpose:

To approve the 2009 free transit days program.

## Background:

The Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System began offering free transit to all riders on two days each year since 2006. This was to assist in the promotion of Clean Air Day in June and to encourage local shopping during the holiday season on a Friday in December. In addition, the Transit System offered free rides to veterans on Remembrance Day in 2007 and 2008. Although this was expanded to a week in 2008, it is much easier to identify veterans on November 11 than the rest of the week. The goal of the free day is to assist in veterans attending ceremonies on Remembrance Day itself.

Ridership increases significantly on these free transit days and various promotions have resulted in growth to ridership following the event. It is recommended that this program continue in 2009 to promote the transit system.

Please find enclosed the amendment to the Cowichan Valley Regional Transit System 2008/09 Annual Operating Agreement (AOA) for your approval.

This amendment reflects the introduction of the Cowichan Valley Commuter (CVC) service to Victoria as well the reassignment of the operating company to Farwest handyDART Services Inc. for the delivery of the Cowichan Valley Regional Transit (COW) service. This amendment is effective September 2, 2008. You will note that the net Local Share of the CVC service for the period October 20 to December 31, 2008 is forecast to be zero based on the revenue and expenditure estimates. This is due to a Provincial contribution of \$48,680 towards the earlier implementation of this service.

The amendments include:

Schedule "B": individual Service Schedules for CVC and COW.

- Schedule "C": individual Budgets reflecting costs relating to the additional service.
- Schedule "D": a combined Payment Schedule that reflects revised payment rates to the operating company based on the new budgets.

I'm a Camosun College student living in Duncan. I commute to Camosun Interurban Campus Mon-Fri to attend classes. I drive my own vehicle and am struggling with car, gas, and parking payments. There is a new Cowichan commuter bus that travels from Duncan to Victoria. I would very much like to take this bus, but it is not affordable for me to do so. Currently, the monthly pass for the Cowichan Commuter is \$200/month. The student rate is also \$200/month. Students are working with negative incomes, shouldn't they be given a reduced rate to help alleviate some of the financial burdens while studying? Especially when the transit provider is municipally and provincially funded/managed?

I've spoken with Student Services at Camosun and they are willing to distribute a cut of the student service fees to Cowichan Transit to allow Camosun Students commuting from Duncan free passes on the commuter. Currently, Camosun students pay fees for a Upass; a pass giving students free passes on buses throughout greater Victoria. The Cowichan commuter allows commuting students from Cowichan the ability to utilize this Upass. This is the reason why Camosun Student Services has agreed to redistribute funding for the Upass to the appropriate Transit Centers. What should I do to facilitate this process on the Cowichan Transit end?



A location plan of the subject property and a site plan showing the development concept are attached. Should you or the Committee require additional information regarding the application or this request, please contact me at your convenience.




