Subject: Public Consultation Summary Report

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Tetra Tech Canada Inc. (Tetra Tech) has prepared this Public Consultation Summary Report with input from the Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) staff and the Plan Advisory Committee (PAC). This summary describes the public consultation undertaken by the CVRD during the 2018 Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) Update. The process was designed to meet elector approval requirements for any fund borrowing required for the SWMP Update implementation.

The consultation process was completed to meet the *Environmental Management Act* requirements by addressing public consultation considerations throughout the solid waste management planning process. Interested parties were provided opportunities for input on the SWMP Update to receive feedback which was subsequently incorporated into the amended SWMP Update. A mix of tools including a Public Advisory Committee, (online and in person) surveys, web presence, media, social media, open houses, and stakeholder meetings were used to create meaningful context for engagement and generate input to inform the SWMP Update.

The Figure 1 Flow Chart shows how the CVRD SWMP Update process was overseen.

1.1 Background and Consultation Objectives

Approval of the SWMP by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (Ministry) requires the SWMP Update to have undergone adequate consultation with the general public and potentially affected stakeholders.

The key objectives for the SWMP consultation program were to:

- Inform the general public and potentially affected stakeholders about the content of the SWMP Update;
- Provide various ways for interested parties to provide input and feedback on the SWMP Update;
- Ensure the amended SWMP Update aligns with information gathered during the consultation feedback; and
- Address public consultation considerations outlined in the Solid Waste Management Planning Guide and meet Ministry requirements under the *Environment Management Act*.

The actions completed to meet these objectives are summarized in the sections below.





2.0 PLAN INITIATION

On January 10, 2018, the CVRD Board approved the SWMP 2018 Update by approval of the 2018 Solid Waste Management Budget, which included funding for the SWMP Update, through adoption of Bylaw No. 4172 – Five Year Financial Plan (2018-2022) Amendment. On January 24, 2018, the Board moved that a Solid Waste Management Plan Advisory Committee (PAC) be established to receive feedback from the public and special interest groups for the SWMP Update process; and further, that an Oversight Committee of four Elected Officials be established to oversee the project's status, budget and schedule.

Between February 8, 2018 and March 9, 2018, the CVRD sent notification letters to 122 Interested Parties including the Ministry, all regional First Nations and municipal governments, the Vancouver Island Recycling and Waste Industry Coalition (VIRWIC) as well as retailers, haulers, processors, and depot operators, advising of the SWMP Update and seeking nominations for the PAC. Neighboring regional districts were informed about plan initiation. A website Update was also launched on February 8, 2018 announcing the SWMP Update and call for nominees. Facebook and Twitter posts boosted the website announcement, and it was promoted in regional print media. Board motions, notification letters, and a list of Interested Parties are provided in Appendix 1.

3.0 PLAN ADVISORY COMMITEE

Upon initiation of the SWMP Update, the CVRD chose to convene a combined public and technical advisory group, the Plan Advisory Committee. The combined approach efficiently utilized planning resources and considered the scheduling difficulties in bringing a diverse membership together on a regular and consistent basis. PAC selection ensured both public and technical input would be provided throughout the planning process and was reviewed by the Oversight Committee. Terms of reference were developed with CVRD Board approval and members from various residential and business sectors were included, as shown in Table 3-1. Oversight Committee members are listed in Table 3-2.

The PAC represented individuals and organizations interested in solid waste management. Members were chosen by the oversight committee based on geography, demographics, interests, and perspectives. As specified in the Ministry's Guide to Solid Waste Management Planning (Guide), Federal government representatives were also invited to the table but were not available to participate.

The PAC's role included:

- Receiving technical SWMP reports;
- Receiving public feedback on the SWMP Update throughout the amendment process; and
- Providing recommendations to the Board for consideration.

The PAC met in-person seven times and via webinar two times, for a total of eight meetings from March 29, 2018 to October 4, 2018. The PAC Terms of Reference, a meeting list, and meeting minutes, are provided in Appendix 2. On October 4, 2018, the PAC received all feedback recorded to date, discussed the public consultation process and provided recommendations to finalize the public consultation report with recommendations to the CVRD Board for consideration.

4.0 PUBLIC CONSULTATION DESIGN

After initial notification to interested parties was provided and the PAC was established, a public consultation process was designed. The PAC reviewed and provided input to the Consultation Plan, which is included as Appendix 3 and outlined in Table 4-1.

Stage one engagement occurred before the first PAC meeting. Activities included media releases to drive community members to the website, the PAC announcement, and outreach to First Nations. Targeted direct outreach was also used to recruit PAC members.



Stage two engagement activities included online and in-person surveys (which were promoted online, through social media, and through print media), an open house, website updates, the use of PlaceSpeak (an online engagement platform designed for location-based public consultation) to host background information, and storyboards displayed at recreation facilities across the region. Technical memoranda and meeting minutes were posted to the webpage and to PlaceSpeak after each PAC meeting. Updates were provided to the CVRD Board at key stages during the process; the timing and frequency of updates was developed with recommendations from the Oversight Committee.

Stage three engagement activities included a focused consultation period for the SWMP Update, which involved a second survey and a series of open houses and outreach events. The focused consultation period began on August 24, 2018 and continued through to September 14, 2018.

5.0 PARTICIPATION

Public consultation was executed through the various steps of the planning process. This section summarizes activities that took place during public consultation.

Extensive stakeholder engagement took place at various stages during the SWMP Update. Stakeholders included a mix of government officials, various industry and hauler representatives, First Nations, product stewards, businesses, generators, and members of the public.

- Twenty-one in-person participation events were held with 547 people reached;
- Three web-based participation events (surveys) were held with 960 responses; and
- A total of 440 verbal and written comments were received.





Several qualitative and quantitative methods were used to obtain public feedback during the SWMP Update including emails, letters, Facebook comments, meetings, open houses, surveys, and community outreach via staffed information booths. Quantitative data was obtained through surveys while the majority of qualitative input was received as written comments submitted on comment cards during open houses, by email, and as part of survey responses.

Appendix 4 includes a summary of engagement initiatives.

5.1 In-Person Participation

In-person consultation was held with industry stakeholders, member municipalities, community-interest groups, and First Nations. A detailed list of meetings with dates, attendance numbers, and number of residents reached is provided in the tables below. Four open houses were held between April and September 2018, which were attended by 312 community members, as show in Table 5-1. Additional stakeholder meetings are listed in Table 5-2.

At open houses, storyboards were displayed that highlighted key information for the SWMP Update and presentations were given by CVRD staff that included question and answer sessions. At August and September open houses, attendees were able to provide feedback via comment cards, comment brochures, and informal 'dotmocracy' boards. Dotmocracy boards are a way to collect input from attendees on the level of support for strategies using dot stickers. In dot-voting, participants vote on their chosen options using a limited number of stickers — dot stickers being the most common. Participants are expected to review, consider and compare all options before showing support for or against a given option. A criticism of dot-voting is the ability of participants to add extra dots or move existing dots by peeling them off. For this reason, participants normally receive a set number of dots to vote with, and voting is done in a facilitated environment, where participation can be monitored. The dotmocracy process and results are described in more detail in Section 8.0 below. Hard copies of surveys were also available at all open houses. Copies of dotmocracy results and open house materials are provided in Appendix 4.

5.2 Web-Based Participation

Web-based participation included surveys, website and PlaceSpeak updates, and social media engagement. Feedback was received through survey responses and emails submitted during the SWMP Update. 5.3 First Nations' Participation

Notification of the SWMP Update was provided to all 10 First Nations with reserve lands within the CVRD as well as the Snuneymuxw First Nation and the Hul-qumi'num Treaty Group. It was later determined that the Snuneymuxw First Nation does not have reserve lands within the regional district, and that the Hul-qumi-num Treat Group is no longer actively operating; these organizations were not contacted further. Follow up contact efforts were made with remaining First Nations, and staff offered to attend all communities in-person to discuss the SWMP Update process, potential impacts, and opportunities for consultation. The degree to which each First Nation may be affected by the SWMP Update varies as not all Nations have communities within the regional district. Engagement efforts were concentrated to a greater degree on those communities that have significant infrastructure within the Plan area.

Cowichan Tribes, the largest First Nation within the region, is a member of the Plan Advisory Committee. The Halalt, Lake Cowichan, and Stz'uminus First Nations each requested and received one-on-one meetings with staff to discuss the SWMP Update, potential impacts, and opportunities for ongoing consultation. These meetings are





summarized in Table 5-4. Two additional First Nations, Lyackson and Malahat, routed the SWMP Update Notification to the referrals process. No further communications have been received to-date. No responses were received from the Ditidaht, Pacheedaht, Pauquachin, Penelakut and Snuneymuxw First Nations. A summary of consultation efforts is provided in Appendix 5.

6.0 **PROMOTION AND ADVERTISING**

Several strategies were used to promote opportunities for learning about the planning process and for providing input into the process. These methods resulted in robust survey responses (118 in Survey 1 and 142 in Survey 2), more than 312 residents attending one of the four open houses, and strong visibility online and on social media with more than 20,000 people reached.

A broad range of promotion and advertising strategies were used over the course of the SWMP Update, including but not limited to: media releases and earned media, print and radio advertising, social media promotion and handouts. A fuller description of engagement tools is provided below:

- Website updates a dedicated page with a simple URL was created for the duration of the project (cvrd.bc.ca/swmp), promotional information was also displayed on the CVRD Recycling and Waste Management Division's home landing page;
- PlaceSpeak a dedicated PlaceSpeak page was created with information that mirrored that of cvrd.bc.ca/swmp;
- Newspaper & Radio Advertisements were released at regular intervals throughout the project as were media releases that resulted in earned media (e.g. print articles and radio interviews);
- Newsletters information about the SWMP Update was circulated to more than 1,000 businesses via the Duncan Chamber of Commerce electronic newsletter (e-newsletter);
- Social media all consultation events, newspaper and radio advertisements were boosted on Facebook and Twitter, and videos were produced to promote surveys and the consultation process;
- Handouts a "bookmark" handout was developed and distributed during the public consultation period to all scale house customers at all three CVRD Recycling Centres; bookmarks were also displayed and distributed at the CVRD offices and at community outreach events; and
- Displays a poster board display informing residents of the SWMP Update with website and feedback information was displayed in the lobbies of all regional recreation centres. Lobby monitor displays were also utilized where possible.

Appendix 6 contains a summary of promotion activities and copies of all promotion and advertising materials used throughout the SWMP Update.



7.0 PUBLIC CONSULTATION FEEDBACK

During the SWMP Update, interim consultation reports were produced to document the feedback received and share the results of the consultation to the PAC. A list of the interim consultation reports and themes is presented in Table 7-1.

PREFERRED STRATEGIES **8.0**

As described in Section 5.1, several quantitative and qualitative engagement methods were used to obtain public feedback during the SWMP Update, including surveys, in-person meetings and open houses, and community outreach via staffed information booths. This section includes information on how feedback from consultation was taken into consideration as well as the process followed to arrive at the preferred strategies. This process is summarized in Table 8-1, which outlines public feedback and decisions by strategy option.

Overall, approximately 1,600 individuals participated in the SWMP Update by providing feedback through both quantitative means such as surveys, as well as qualitative tools including emails, letters, and verbal and written comments offered during in-person participation events such as open houses and stakeholder meetings. Feedback is generally supportive of the overall goals and strategies outlined in the SWMP Update. All comments and feedback received are included in Appendix 5. Comments received related to the strategies proposed in the SWMP Update do not register any significant opposition, and are generally supportive of the goals, targets and proposed strategies as reflected in Table 8-2 Public Feedback on Strategy Options and related appendices.

Significant feedback was received in the south end (Electoral Areas A, B and C) in relation to Strategy 3.B.i, which proposes the implementation of universal, three-stream curbside collection. Residents expressed support for the current private sector service provider operating in the area and concern over potential costs, loss of choice and loss of optional service. A summary of concerns and support for the strategy is provided in Table 8-2 below. Comments regarding service provision are included in Appendix 5.

8.1 Dotmocracy Voting

As noted in Section 5.1, an additional feedback tool used during the consultation period was dot-voting using dotmocracy boards. Dotmocracy boards listing the strategies along with support, and do not support, columns, were provided during three open houses held between August 24, 2018 and September 14, 2018, Results are outlined below.

- In Open House 2, no dots were placed, and three written comments were added to the boards
- In Open House 3, 631 dots and several written comments were added to the boards





In Open House 4, no dots or comments were placed on the boards

Dotmocracy voting results have been included in Appendix 5, which contains all feedback received during the public consultation period. Dotmocracy voting results should be considered in light of the following limitations:

- Voting was not monitored, and the number of dots issued was not controlled
- The actual number of dotmocracy participants is not known
 - At the open house held in Cobble Hill, 242 registered attendees placed 631 dots, meaning that some (or several) participants voted more than once
 - It was observed that several dots were placed before the presentation commenced, meaning that the extent to which participants were able to review, consider and compare the options prior to voting is not known

8.2 Public Feedback on Strategy Options

Table 8-1 summarizes how public feedback influenced proposed strategy options. The table uses survey data as a quantitative indicator of public support for each strategy (see Level of Support). Qualitative feedback is captured through comments that summarize the general tone and theme of feedback received from PAC meetings as well as during the consultation process and highlights potential risks or concerns with strategies where appropriate (see 'Support and Concerns'). Rationale for the recommendation of strategy options is provided in 'Strategy Decisions'. It is of note that some survey respondents did not to Strategies 11-13, perhaps due to survey fatigue, which may have slightly affected the results.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SWMPAC) TERMS OF REFERENCE

INTRODUCTION

Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) prepared its first Solid Waste Management Plans (SWMP) in 1995, followed by three amendments, 2006 being the latest amendment. The SWMP is currently due for its fourth amendment. Regional districts in British Columbia are mandated by the *Environmental Management Act* of BC to develop Solid Waste Management Plans (SWMP) and submit to the Ministry of Environment & Climate Change Strategy (ENV). SWMP reflects its commitment and long term vision towards municipal waste management. As per latest amendments recommended by the ENV, the SWMP is considered for 10 years with a review of plan effectiveness by the end of each five year period.

Public consultation is the critical part and a requirement for the SWMP amendment approval process by the ENV. A combined public and technical advisory committee is desired representing both community and technical interests at the same table. This Solid Waste Management Plan Advisory Committee (SWMPAC) will provide the most transparent, accountable and productive vehicle for meaningful involvement from a variety of interest groups.

PURPOSE

The SWMPAC will provide its feedback to the CVRD Board of Directors (Board) for their final consideration. The SWMPAC will review current SWMP, issues and opportunities for planning and implementation of future solid waste management for the region and provide its feedback to the Board for fourth amendment of the SWMP for final submission to the ENV. The SWMPAC will focus on topics, such as policies, bylaws, new initiatives, strategies, short term goals, long term vision, related budget, public consultation, and other SWMP related items.

ROLE OF SWMPAC

The Committee's role will be:

- to receive technical reports from CVRD technical team dedicated for the SWMP;
- to receive feedback on SWMP from the community and stakeholders;
- participate on smaller subcommittees dealing with specific issues or tasks;
- to consider information in an open, transparent forum;
- strive to keep abreast of solid waste management issues both locally and in a broader, regional context;
- to prepare agendas and record minutes of all the meetings; and,
- to provide recommendations to the Board for their consideration.

AUTHORITY

The SWMPAC will be a committee established by the Board for the SWMP Amendment #4 process.

BUDGET

Initial budget for the SWMP was approved by the Board under budget Function 520 – Solid Waste Management Complex. Any changes to the budget related to SWMPAC will be considered by the CVRD Board.

STRUCTURE OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee membership will represent individuals and organizations interested in solid waste management. Selection of members will attempt to create a committee with a balance of representation:

- geographically;
- demographically; and
- with a variety of interests and perspectives.

APPOINTED COMMITTEE MEMBERS

The committee will consist of 17 members. Members will be appointed by the Board through an application process. Membership representation will be as follows:

Committee members will be appointed by the Board. The application for committee membership will be promoted through advertisements in local media, CVRD website and social media. Applications must demonstrate the applicant's:

- representation of one of the sectors listed above;
- willingness and ability to commit to volunteering the necessary time to the committee;
- interest in solid waste issues in the CVRD;

- willingness and ability to consider regional issues from all sectors and geographical perspectives within the community;
- experience related to solid waste issues; and,
- willingness and ability to work towards consensus on issues being addressed by the committee.

CHAIR & VICE CHAIR

CVRD staff will be the Chair and Vice Chair of the SWMPAC.

TERM OF OFFICE

The Term of Office for each member will be until the final submission of the SWMP Amendment #4 to the ENV or a maximum of two (2) year term, whichever comes first.

SWMPAC participation is voluntary with no remuneration provided for members' time.

COMMITTEE DECISION-MAKING

- Meeting quorum will be nine (9) members in attendance;
- All members of the SWMPAC will be treated equal and feedback will be recorded as presented by the individual member;
- Conflict of interest must be declared before providing feedback; and,
- SWMPAC recommendations will consider all feedback recorded.

MEETING PROTOCOL

SWMPAC meetings are expected to be held at least four times, approximately one month apart, in 2018. Locations and schedule of the meetings will be discussed during the first meeting before finalizing for 2018.

Special Interest Group meetings or other special meetings may be called as needed at the discretion of the Committee at a location agreeable to the members.

CVRD staff will provide administrative support to the Committee including, but not limited to the scheduling of meetings, agenda preparation, electronic distribution, minute taking and distribution of materials.

SWMPAC meetings will be open to the public, however non-SWMPAC members will not have speaking or feedback privileges. Public consultation for the SWMP will be conducted separately to discuss individual items and to receive public in-put. Delegations that wish to address the committee must seek approval from the committee through a written request or a separate meeting may be requested with special interest group. Acceptance of a delegate's request to speak to the committee will be at the discretion of the committee.

Less than half of respondents reported satisfaction with communication and education. The top 3 values were waste reduction, diversion and environmental protection. Preliminary comments included frustration with which materials can be recycled and lack of collection for bulky items, yard waste, single-use items, film plastic and glass.

The Committee members broke into partners to discuss the goals and record feedback on worksheets. Members discussed and shared their feedback with the group.

The Committee was presented with eight options under the reduce, reuse, recycle category, four under recovery and residuals management, and three under operational improvements, for consideration and were asked to identify the most important options. Members were asked to vote on options that they felt most strongly about during a feedback exercise.

A preliminary shortlist of options was presented indicating how each weighted in conjunction with the draft guiding principles.

Meeting goals were presented and Tetra Tech provided the PowerPoint Presentation CVRD Solid Waste Management Plan Update – Meeting 4. Strategies will be sent to absent members, comments will be collected and opportunity for separate meeting provided.

1 Project Update

An updated timeline was provided with the addition of a webinar in August. Public consultation begins late August through mid-September.

2 Plan Context

Guiding principles, goals, targets and diversion potentials were reviewed. Discussion ensued around reasons for universal curbside service, potential ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and the benefits of universal (mandatory) collection. Development of a public facility in the south end was discussed with focus on monitoring service levels and responding if needed. No budget or staff time is assigned to this ongoing item. 3

Strategies were reviewed as related to resourcing, financial implications and schedule for the plan. Comments and questions were addressed for strategies one through 13. In-depth discussion was held on strategy three regarding monitoring access to depots in south end and universal collection. Reasons for considering these strategies were discussed, including benefits of universal collection (reduction in organic waste disposed and reduced contamination). Potential ways to reduce GHG emissions from the program were also discussed. It was explained that monitoring depot access was added to strategies in lieu of development of a public depot, but that this would be a simple ongoing item with no budget or staff time assigned. Each PAC member in attendance was issued a series of green – support, yellow – have questions, and red – do not support, cards for voting on the draft strategies. All members unanimously supported each strategy.

4 Handout Review

The SWMP Amendment - Schedule dated August 1, 2018, and the SWMP Amendment – Budget dated August 1, 2018, were distributed, reviewed and discussed.

5 Consultation Update

Public consultation begins online August 24, 2018, and will continue through September 14, 2018. Open houses and other community events are scheduled through this period to engage residents and visitors. Webinar # 3 is scheduled for August 20, 2018. A public consultation report will be prepared for discussion at the October 2018 PAC meeting.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

Tetra Tech Canada Inc. (Tetra Tech) was requested to prepare a consultation plan with input from the Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) staff, the Oversight Committee, and the Plan Advisory Committee (PAC). Engaging the public and key stakeholders is an integral aspect of the solid waste management planning process. Involving all parties affected by the outcomes will also ensure innovative ideas are captured and buy in for system adjustments are accepted. As per the updated 2016 Solid Waste Management Planning Guide, interested parties include, but are not limited to: various levels of government including First Nations; waste and recycling providers; environmental groups, other community associations, various generators across sectors; entrepreneurs; and interested individuals.

The consultation process will be completed to meet the *Environmental Management Act* requirements by addressing public consultation considerations throughout the solid waste management planning process. The intent is to provide interested parties with the opportunity for input on the plan and ensure that feedback is incorporated into the amended plan.

Tetra Tech will use the 2016 Solid Waste Management Planning Guide that reinforces the importance of creating a meaningful context for engagement by understanding the audience to build trust and inclusion, setting clear expectations about the scope for discussion, being transparent with information, being responsive and accountable, and having an adequate amount of time and resources to implement engagement successfully.

2.0 CONSULTATION PLAN

The consultation plan consists of the following:

- Consultation with a PAC composed of technical members and members of the public;
- Consultation with an Oversight Committee composed of four CVRD politicians; and
- Public engagement.

2.1 Advisory Committee

The CVRD Oversight Committee selected the 17 members of the PAC representing key stakeholder groups. The PAC terms of reference is attached in Appendix B.

The group will be selected in February 2018 and will first convene in March 2018. Multiple tools will be used to conduct outreach to interested members of the public, including:

- A public announcement; and
- Outreach directed towards key stakeholders.

A long list of applicants will be compiled, and then will be reduced to a short list of key stakeholders who are representative across geography.

This group will meet approximately five times and are bound to the group's Terms of Reference.

2.2 Oversight Committee

The Oversight Committee is comprised of four regionally representative CVRD Board members approved by the CVRD Board. The Oversight Committee will advise on the process, review material, and serve as liaison to the Board.

2.3 Public Consultation

2.3.1 Overview

Public engagement is an important component of the solid waste management planning process. Tetra Tech will work closely with CVRD staff to engage key stakeholders including community members, commercial businesses, First Nations, and generators throughout each project phase and will incorporate the tools below as relevant.

- Online Tools and Local Media Early in the project, the community at large will be made aware of the solid waste management planning process and opportunities to provide input. Website updates and use of traditional and social media to reach a broad audience (given not all British Columbians have online access), will be used to initially engage the community.
- PlaceSpeak (Online platform for public consultation) Planning documents will be published on PlaceSpeak and residents and stakeholders may provide input during appropriate times.
- Surveys Residents and stakeholders will be contacted using surveys to provide feedback. Online, phone, and face-to-face surveys can be an effective way to gauge public feedback and can be presented via the CVRD website, PlaceSpeak, social media, or during public engagement activities.
- Targeted Stakeholder Engagement Tetra Tech will work with CVRD staff and the PAC to identify suitable
 participants for a stakeholder group with members representing a cross-section of the community. This group
 will play a central role in providing feedback for the priority options developed.
- Interviews As needed, one-on-one phone interviews will be conducted with key stakeholders. Tetra Tech
 plans to conduct interviews throughout the process to inform and shape the research process.
- First Nations Engagement All First Nations within the Plan area have been notified of the Plan Amendment and opportunities for input. Follow-up steps will include visiting First Nations communities to discuss the amendment, and attending Chief and Council meetings as requested

The consultation plan will include the methodology for tracking and assessing the implementation of the plan to exceed the requirement for "adequate" consultation referenced in the 2016 Solid Waste Management Planning Guide.

2.3.2 Phase One

The initial round of public consultation will occur in the early phases of the planning process. It will begin before the advisory committee convenes and continue until the initial draft of the Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP) Amendment is developed.





This phase is intended to provide the community with information about the planning process and select an advisory committee. This phase of public consultation will include:

1. CVRD Website update

- Direct website visitors to past SWMPs;
- Direct website visitors to recent studies; and
- Explain solid waste management planning process, opportunities for input, and timelines.

2. Advisory Committee Announcement

- Publicize a call for members of the advisory committee; and
- Conduct directed outreach towards representatives of key stakeholder groups.

3. First Nations Outreach

• Notify all First Nations within the Plan Area and offer to visit communities to meet and discuss plan.

2.3.3 Phase Two

After the first PAC meeting, public consultation will occur to provide the public with pertinent information early in the planning process and gather a general 'pulse' on issues that the community hopes will be addressed during the SWMP process.

1. Online & In-Person Survey(s)

- Gain a general sense of community satisfaction and needs through surveys posted online and also conducted at CVRD Recycling Centres, recreation centres, and community events (e.g., hockey games, farmer's markets); and
- The online survey should include questions to determine demographic information such as sector and location.

2. Open House

• An open house will be held between the first and the second PAC meeting to present the solid waste management planning process and the current CVRD solid waste management system to the public.

3. PlaceSpeak (Online Platform for Public Consultation)

• Prepared planning documents and PAC meeting minutes will be hosted on PlaceSpeak for public viewing.

4. CVRD Website Update

• Prepared planning documents and PAC meeting minutes will be hosted on the CVRD website for public viewing.

2.3.4 Phase Three

The results of the first two phases of public consultation will be incorporated into a draft (Issued for Review) SWMP. At this time, options will be more thoroughly developed. The third phase of public consultation will consist of more focused feedback and engagements on the proposed SWMP Amendments with a focus on communities or groups explicitly impacted by any of the potential changes (e.g., collection changes or infrastructure development).





A preliminary plan for public engagement is laid out in this document. However, the direction of this phase of public consultation should be highly dependent on the options which are presented in the draft SWMP Amendment. Following the development of the draft SWMP Amendment, CVRD and Tetra Tech will modify this plan to tailor these options. Then, the preliminary plan will be presented to the advisory committee for approval. The plan will be revised accordingly, then implemented.

This phase of the communications plan is expected to include the following elements:

1. PlaceSpeak

• Once options have been more well-developed, gain additional community insight on options via an interactive online forum.

2. Open Houses

• Three open houses will be held to provide a venue for interested community members to learn about and provide feedback on the SWMP Amendment.

3. Social Media Tools

• Social media tools will be used to notify the public of highlights of the SWMP Amendment, Open Houses, and to direct the public to PlaceSpeak.

4. Stakeholder Meetings

• As relevant to specific options, there may be a need to convene stakeholder groups (e.g., community associations, business groups, etc.).

2.3.5 Timeline

The timeline for the public consultation is presented in Table 1. This is subject to change.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SWMPAC) TERMS OF REFERENCE

INTRODUCTION

Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) prepared its first Solid Waste Management Plans (SWMP) in 1995, followed by three amendments, 2006 being the latest amendment. The SWMP is currently due for its fourth amendment. Regional districts in British Columbia are mandated by the *Environmental Management Act* of BC to develop Solid Waste Management Plans (SWMP) and submit to the Ministry of Environment & Climate Change Strategy (ENV). SWMP reflects its commitment and long term vision towards municipal waste management. As per latest amendments recommended by the ENV, the SWMP is considered for 10 years with a review of plan effectiveness by the end of each five year period.

Public consultation is the critical part and a requirement for the SWMP amendment approval process by the ENV. A combined public and technical advisory committee is desired representing both community and technical interests at the same table. This Solid Waste Management Plan Advisory Committee (SWMPAC) will provide the most transparent, accountable and productive vehicle for meaningful involvement from a variety of interest groups.

PURPOSE

The SWMPAC will provide its feedback to the CVRD Board of Directors (Board) for their final consideration. The SWMPAC will review current SWMP, issues and opportunities for planning and implementation of future solid waste management for the region and provide its feedback to the Board for fourth amendment of the SWMP for final submission to the ENV. The SWMPAC will focus on topics, such as policies, bylaws, new initiatives, strategies, short term goals, long term vision, related budget, public consultation, and other SWMP related items.

ROLE OF SWMPAC

The Committee's role will be:

- to receive technical reports from CVRD technical team dedicated for the SWMP;
- to receive feedback on SWMP from the community and stakeholders;
- participate on smaller subcommittees dealing with specific issues or tasks;
- to consider information in an open, transparent forum;
- strive to keep abreast of solid waste management issues both locally and in a broader, regional context;
- to prepare agendas and record minutes of all the meetings; and,
- to provide recommendations to the Board for their consideration.

AUTHORITY

The SWMPAC will be a committee established by the Board for the SWMP Amendment #4 process.

BUDGET

Initial budget for the SWMP was approved by the Board under budget Function 520 – Solid Waste Management Complex. Any changes to the budget related to SWMPAC will be considered by the CVRD Board.

STRUCTURE OF THE COMMITTEE

The Committee membership will represent individuals and organizations interested in solid waste management. Selection of members will attempt to create a committee with a balance of representation:

- geographically;
- demographically; and
- with a variety of interests and perspectives.

APPOINTED COMMITTEE MEMBERS

The committee will consist of 17 members. Members will be appointed by the Board through an application process. Membership representation will be as follows:

Committee members will be appointed by the Board. The application for committee membership will be promoted through advertisements in local media, CVRD website and social media. Applications must demonstrate the applicant's:

- representation of one of the sectors listed above;
- willingness and ability to commit to volunteering the necessary time to the committee;
- interest in solid waste issues in the CVRD;

- willingness and ability to consider regional issues from all sectors and geographical perspectives within the community;
- experience related to solid waste issues; and,
- willingness and ability to work towards consensus on issues being addressed by the committee.

CHAIR & VICE CHAIR

CVRD staff will be the Chair and Vice Chair of the SWMPAC.

TERM OF OFFICE

The Term of Office for each member will be until the final submission of the SWMP Amendment #4 to the ENV or a maximum of two (2) year term, whichever comes first.

SWMPAC participation is voluntary with no remuneration provided for members' time.

COMMITTEE DECISION-MAKING

- Meeting quorum will be nine (9) members in attendance;
- All members of the SWMPAC will be treated equal and feedback will be recorded as presented by the individual member;
- Conflict of interest must be declared before providing feedback; and,
- SWMPAC recommendations will consider all feedback recorded.

MEETING PROTOCOL

SWMPAC meetings are expected to be held at least four times, approximately one month apart, in 2018. Locations and schedule of the meetings will be discussed during the first meeting before finalizing for 2018.

Special Interest Group meetings or other special meetings may be called as needed at the discretion of the Committee at a location agreeable to the members.

CVRD staff will provide administrative support to the Committee including, but not limited to the scheduling of meetings, agenda preparation, electronic distribution, minute taking and distribution of materials.

SWMPAC meetings will be open to the public, however non-SWMPAC members will not have speaking or feedback privileges. Public consultation for the SWMP will be conducted separately to discuss individual items and to receive public in-put. Delegations that wish to address the committee must seek approval from the committee through a written request or a separate meeting may be requested with special interest group. Acceptance of a delegate's request to speak to the committee will be at the discretion of the committee.

Pollution prevention (5R) hierarchy



A Solid Waste Management Plan provides a vision for managing waste over the next **20 to 30 years,** with clear actions set out for the next ten years.

It covers all forms of **municipal solid** waste including garbage, recycling, and construction/demolition waste. It does not include agricultural, industrial, forestry, liquid or hazardous waste. The Plan sets out how waste and recycling will be managed in the region, including collection, recycling and composting, processing, waste reduction, education, financing and disposal.

Part of a successful Plan is setting a target. In the previous Plan, the community supported the goal of **Zero Waste**. This means reducing and ultimately eliminating waste. The Plan should also identify gaps, and opportunities for improvement in the CVRD's waste management system. Solutions should be prioritized according to the **Pollution prevention (5R) hierarchy.**

Why are we updating the Plan?

The CVRD's Solid Waste Management Plan is more than ten years old. It needs updating to make sure it continues to reflect the region's goals and objectives for solid waste management.

What happens to our garbage & recycling?



The CVRD does not have a landfill. All garbage is shipped to out-of-region landfills, with most of it going to the Roosevelt Regional Landfill in Washington State, USA.

The Roosevelt Regional Landfill is located in a very dry part of Washington State that receives just 15 to 22 cm of rainfall every year. This means that there is less potential for leachate. Gas produced by the landfill is recovered and turned into electricity, which creates enough energy to power more than 20,000 homes.

Shipping our waste out-of-region is expensive, so it's important to reduce the quantity as much as possible. Reducing waste also reduces our Greenhouse Gas Emissions, and recycling materials locally keeps jobs in the local economy. The CVRD has a strong local recycling industry, with many private sector processors located right here in the Valley, which means there are a lot of opportunities to recycle close to home.

What kind of services do we have in the region?



Making recycling convenient is an important part of reducing waste. CVRD residents are fortunate because there is a wide range of drop-off locations within the region, including bottle depots, take-back-programs at grocery stores and retailers, and both public as well as private drop-off depots.

The growing popularity of food waste diversion programs means that **it's important to have facilities that can compost food and yard waste**. The CVRD has three private Composting facilities, but more capacity may be needed if food and yard waste diversion programs expand.

How do we pay for waste management?





The CVRD manages a regional solid waste budget that is funded by disposal charges (fees paid when dropping off waste or recyclables at depots), and requisition (taxation). All member municipalities and Electoral Areas pay in to the regional solid waste budget. The annual value of the regional solid waste budget is about \$7.8M. This covers operation of three public recycling centres (Bings Creek, Meade Creek and Peerless Road), and the region's central transfer station at Bings Creek, as well as regional waste planning and education programs. Curbside collection programs are managed separately. If you live in a municipality, your collection program is funded by your municipality. If you live in an Electoral Area, your curbside collection is managed by the CVRD or a private contractor. The CVRD spends about \$1.3M per year to provide curbside collection for recyclables in all nine Electoral Areas, and curbside garbage collection in five Electoral Areas. Recycling costs are offset by payments from Recycle BC. The rest of the budget is funded by user fees. No taxes are used.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN AMENDMENT NO. 4

The CVRD produces an average of 358 kg of garbage per person per year. This is 30,100 metric tonnes of garbage that is managed at CVRD facilities and ultimately shipped off the island to a landfill in Washington. The CVRD has developed a Draft Solid Waste Management Plan Update that provides guidance for the handling of municipal solid waste (i.e. garbage and recycling) throughout the CVRD. This plan is updated approximately every 10 years. The Draft SWMP Update is the result of collaboration and input from regional district and municipal staff, consultants, elected officials, industry stakeholders, and members of the public. The Draft SWMP Update is now ready for your feedback. We want to know what you think of the ideas for how we can reduce the amount of waste we send for disposal and, at the same time, keep the cost of the system financially sustainable.

The CVRD wants to build on our successes as a leader in solid waste management. The Draft SWMP Update identifies opportunities to further reduce the amount of waste we send to the landfill. The proposed actions summarized are expected to further reduce the amount of waste to landfill by 30% - to 250 kg per capita per year by 2028. This is an important step in the long-term goal of making the Cowichan Valley a Zero Waste Community.

Let's build on our successes and reduce our waste even more. Your feedback is crucial to the development of this new plan guiding the management of municipal solid waste in the CVRD.

Strategy 1: Enhance Reduce and Reuse Potential

Areas for Improvement: There are not enough resources to support the first levels of the pollution prevention hierarchy including rethink, reduce and reuse initiatives.

- Wasted Food Overall, 5,500 tonnes of edible food are being wasted by the residential and industrial, commercial, and institutional sectors.
- Reuse Platforms Historically, there have been limited opportunities to promote reuse within the region. The recent opening of a Habitat for Humanity ReStore within the City of Duncan has significantly improved local capacity for promoting reuse of building materials, but there are still opportunities to further develop reuse capacity, for example, through repair cafes and tool libraries.
- Single-Use Item Reduction Other nearby jurisdictions (Vancouver and Victoria) have recently implemented restrictions to reduce the amount of plastic bags and other singleuse items. Plastic bags are common contaminants in curbside recycling programs and can be problematic for recycling processors.
- Expansion of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Programs Mattresses, bulky furniture, and textiles are not covered by EPR items in British Columbia.

Strategy 2: Reduce Disposal from ICI and Multi-Family Sector

Areas for Improvement: The Institutional, Commercial, and Industrial (ICI) and multi-family residential sectors are largely serviced by the private sector for garbage and recycling (except in Lake Cowichan). Waste composition data demonstrates that these sectors have relatively low diversion rates.

 Source Separation Requirements - The CVRD does not have an existing policy that requires waste haulers to provide institutional, commercial, and industrial and multi-family customers with recycling or organics collection. Materials Disposal Ban - The CVRD has an organics disposal ban for limited types of institutional, commercial, and industrial organic materials, but enforcement could be improved and banned material types could be expanded. Adoption of a full organics disposal ban across sectors has been shown to have a considerable impact on increasing organics capture.

Strategy 3: Reduce disposal from the residential sector

Areas for Improvement: In some areas in the CVRD, residents have limited access to recycling depots or other collection services that optimize residential waste reduction efforts.

Access to Depot Recycling – The majority of CVRD residents live within a 15-minute drive of public drop-off depots in the north, central and west parts of the region. However, more than 18,000 residents in Electoral Areas A, B, and C (Mill Bay, Shawnigan, and Cobble Hill) must drive further to access a public depot, or, may have to pay a fee to recycle items locally which are free to recycle at public depots. Hours of operation also vary widely between depots and public depot hours are limited during the winter.

Curbside Garbage and Organics Collection – Over 33,000 residents in the CVRD do not have mandatory organics collection and over 20,000 residents do not have mandatory garbage collection. Residents with no organics collection, have 13% more organics in the garbage than residents with organics collection. While there is value in continuing to encourage residents to backyard compost; curbside organics collection captures items not typically composted in backyard composters.

All residents in Electoral Areas are provided with curbside recycling collection by the CVRD via an agreement with Recycle BC (the organization responsible for residential packaging and printed paper recycling in British Columbia). Since the widespread adoption of RecycleBC's services across the province, audits show that areas with curbside garbage collection have much lower contamination rates in recycling. In CVRD Electoral Areas, recycling contamination rates are significantly above the norm and are higher in areas without

mandatory garbage collection. Contamination rates will result in significant financial penalties to the CVRD and may inhibit the CVRD's ability to secure future service with RecycleBC. From a diversion perspective, jurisdictions across western Canada have consistently shown a 35-40% drop in garbage tonnage when implementing mandatory three-stream curbside collection (recycling, garbage, and organics including food scraps).

Strategy 4: Improve Organics Processing

Area for Improvement: There are several organic processing facilities in the CVRD and many are generating odours that are significantly impacting residents and businesses. As the amount of organics being processed continues to grow, the potential for a growth in odour issues will increase. Furthermore, there is an opportunity to work with facilities and the BC Ministry of Environment & Climate Change Strategy to strengthen odour standards.

Strategy 5: Investigate Processing and Transfer Capacity for Recyclables

Area for Improvement: There is no transfer or processing capacity for comingled Institutional, Commercial, and Industrial recyclable materials in the CVRD. This material is typically hauled outof-region in packer trucks (vs. long haul transfer). Some larger commercial generators (e.g. big box stores) may recycle this material through in-house recycling programs.

The CVRD has one of the highest disposal costs in British Columbia, which impacts residents, businesses, and private collectors and processors. There may be options for local disposal. These options should be explored for feasibility.

- No collection options exist for residents to safely dispose of household hazardous liquids that are not already accepted at depots. These materials are occasionally disposed of in the garbage or illegally dumped, posing health and safety and environmental threats.
- Bulky items, such as furniture and mattresses, are also difficult to dispose of and may contribute to illegal dumping. There are subsidized drop-off programs for mattresses and upholstered sofas and chairs at public depots, but those programs are less accessible for residents who cannot access transportation.
- Burning of organic materials and yard waste continues to be an issue in the CVRD, causing air quality concerns.

- There is no local place to dispose of waste, all garbage is shipped to landfill in Washington State, USA.
- Illegal dumping occurs throughout CVRD
- There are limited options for difficult-to-dispose items
- Old landfill sites in the region must continue to be monitored
- The CVRD does not have a disaster waste management plan

Thank you for the chance to comment on the CVRD Solid Waste Management Plan Amendment 2018.

We pick up recycling and organics and some garbage mainly by bicycle in the downtown Duncan area. We also have a biodiesel fuelled truck that we use for picking up larger organics bins such as the 120 litre bins from Duncan and have just expanded those services to Cowichan Bay. We have over 130 clients, doing on average 20 pick ups a day between 5 staff members. Most of our clients are businesses, government and nonprofit organizations in Duncan, but we also do a few residential strata's.

Because the recycling that we pick up comes under 'Commercial' in the Recycle BC system, we have a relatively huge amount of sorting to do in comparison to the residential curb side pick up system. There are way too many sorting categories for our clients to learn or have space for. They would need the following 12 categories to suite the Bings Creek drop off: soft plastic, other-flexible plastic, spirals and milk cartons, tetra pack/soup containers, glass, metal, cardboard, paper, containers, rubble, refundables (which have their own different categories) and styrofoam. It takes a lot of time to learn which are accepted in the recycling and which are garbage. Plus there are details such as bagging the shredded paper in clear bags and tying the inner tubes together to remember. Another added challenge is that the material list that is accepted by the drop off keep changing, so clients would have to unlearn one habit and start another. The amount of knowledge and time it takes for a client to learn all this is a major barrier to them recycling properly. So we basically do all the sorting for them and it takes a lot of staff time, so becomes quite expensive for us. We have already raised our prices in 2018 to what we feel people are willing to pay.

We are hoping that the new plan will address the challenges around commercial recycling and make it easier for non-residential recyclers to recycle. We are a great service because we help commercial recyclers navigate the complicated system with our staff knowing the ins and outs of it so well now. The challenge we have is that our business is suffering financially as it is of great cost to hire people to sort everything at our shed. We would like to discuss options for the Recyclists such as being in a similar system to residential, where we could drop off mixed materials that would then get sorted by the Nanaimo facility at a larger scale with lower costs than it is for us in our small shed.

We are also interested in partnering with the CVRD on the following initiatives that were discussed at the meeting. We have experience and training in the following areas:

- 1. Educational programs for adults and schools
- 2. Creating educational outreach materials
- 3. Project Coordination for environmental stewardship
- 4. Compost education (especially for those who don't currently have curb-side organics)
- 5. Innovative thinking for how to work towards zero waste

I already filled out your survey on PlaceSpeak, but forgot something, so here it is.

There is a conflict between "recycling must be clean" and "save water".

For cans, I just remove the label and put it in recycling, then put the can in the dishwasher. No extra water used.

Some glass jars suffer from labels that are almost impossible to remove without either lots of hot water or sometimes even solvents. Putting these in the dishwasher without removing the label first can result in paper shreds clogging up the filter. Lobbying for regulations about the kind of glue acceptable on paper labels on jars would help. The brand of peanut butter I use has an easily removed label that doesn't even need soaking, and some others come off easily when soaked.

Plastic containers are the worst. Bakery clamshells often have sticky residue in them that needs washing to remove, and they melt in the dishwasher. That means cleaning them uses extra water. Salad dressing bottles semi-melt in the dishwasher, so have to be washed separately -- and even if you do put them in the dishwasher with the idea that deforming them doesn't matter, they don't wash out well because of their small openings.

But the absolute worst are plastic bags. I don't think the amount of water needed to clean wet or sticky food out of a bag is worth it, so I throw heavily soiled bags in the garbage. Those that I can shake clean I put in a bin to go to Bings Creek.

I don't have any good solutions for this problem, unfortunately :- (Maybe someone else can come up with one.

Attention: All Board Members

This letter is to address a serious issue from the perspective of being a local long-time business owner and a resident living within CVRD jurisdiction. I did request to come and address you personally but was denied that right.

Specifically, my concern is with the un-fair and unethical decisions local government is potentially making and the devastating damage those actions and choices could have on my business. In detail, the CVRD is considering making sweeping changes to the way solid waste is collected and that will adversely impact my company and my clients. As it stood in the draft plan before I resigned this week there was 2.7 million dollars allocated to mandating this service.

Pan Disposal is not, and cannot, be compared to other larger scale waste companies. Our business model and initiatives are very different. We made a conscious decision to stay small and appropriate to the communities we serve. We also chose to stay local, live and work in connection with the communities we serve.

This is a very important fact to take into account. Mandating services is not only taking away our business we've had here, and only here for decades, but provincial legislation states that once services are mandated through CVRD, services will go out for tender. To mandate services you will effectively be choosing to take my business away from me.

I have thousands of individual contracts throughout areas A, B and C. Thousands of clients that will lose the personal service and accommodation we provide. My livelihood and that of my business partner will be destroyed and our equity will be gone as well. The recent moves and choices of local government have extinguished any re-sale value.

I have been in the solid waste industry for 13 years and the owner and operator of PAN Disposal for 10. During that time, Pan Disposal has repeatedly had to deal with the costly and suffocating stress of CVRD takeover threats and to defend this community's right to the service of their choice.

When I brought this up at a previous meeting- that I was asked to attend with CVRD staff- I was told "business is business" and we are realistically always at risk of other companies coming in.

That is true, and a fair competitive market is business. However because we have stayed small and connected with our communities, provide service that suits the needs, we are successful and would continue to be.

What local government is proposing is not a fair and competitive market it is a hostile takeover and an unnecessary and costly replacement of pre-existing efficient services.

There seems to be some confusion around what the provincial government is asking of the CVRD. The provincial government is asking for a review only of waste related services. They are not asking for any implementation or new services, that is strictly the avenue CVRD and their consultation company have taken.

I am an intelligent woman and I do see that the government has more to think about in terms of long term-goals and 'big picture'. I have committed my time on the PAC of the Solid Waste Plan for that reason and I want to do what is best for our community.

I have been speaking with members of the community about this. Being on the PAC committee up until this week has allowed for up-to-date information so I feel I am quite clearly educated on the issues and can accurately speak to what is being proposed.

In speaking with the community it became clear once again there are many layers of emotions around this topic and we are intensely supported. One thing I am consistanlty being asked is "has the CVRD talked about compensation?" My lawyer asked the same question.

My question to you is this.

-if you are committed to this plan

-the board will likely be choosing to vote in the mandated services -you honestly feel this is in the best interest of the community -knowing the devastating consequence of that to PAN Disposal -using our tax dollars to take away choice of us and our customers -knowing that you are destroying a successfully functioning business

Why have you not addressed that I should and will be compensated?

I have a decision to make in regards to how I move forward with the community and my lawyer. That decision is solely based on the response to this letter.

I respectfully request and expect a response by end of day Wednesday August 29th.

Subject: CVRD Open House on Pan Disposal

We understand that the CVRD is considering taking over the garbage and organics collection and disposal, which is currently being provided by a private contractor. We are opposed to the CVRD's possible intervention. We are writing to express our concern about this possible change and to ask some questions about the potential cost/benefit of such a major decision.

We are fully satisfied with the excellent service being provided by the current Pan Disposal company, so do not see the need for changing this. We pay for this service in a transparent and fair way; ie. user pays, and we know exactly what it costs.

Our concern about the CVRD potentially taking this over would be the lack of transparency about the cost and overall efficiency. While the CVRD has estimated an annual operating budget, we do not know what is included in that budget in terms of additional CVRD staffing with all the related overhead, benefit package and pension costs. We are concerned that this would be buried in even higher property tax rates, which are increasing annually at alarming rates, much higher than inflation

We request that a full and detailed information/facts be provided, if the CVRD was to take over this service, including the following:

- Financial analysis including cost of contractors to do the pick-up and disposal and the additional CVRD staff to manage, monitor and administer this operation, providing the cost on a per bag basis;
- Impact on the mill rate or property tax on a per \$100,000 valuation basis;
- How will the procurement of experienced contractors to do the pick-up be done? Are there a number of such contractors available in the area?
- Where would the CVRD dispose of the garbage and organics, at Fisher Road Recycle or where?
- What steps will the CVRD take to prevent/reduce the current contamination of some recycle bins by garbage? Yes, some of it may be due to the cost saving but we expect much of it is lack of knowledge and/or laziness, (do not need to haul another bag/container to the road). Regardless of whether the CVRD takes over this service, some policing/control will be required.

We look forward to hearing more details at the Open House.

With three children and an overworked husband, it's a bit of a chore to get everyone to properly compost and recycle, but we do it and I truly feel that we have one of the heaviest compost cans in our neighbourhood. It's been years since the owners of PAN Disposal dug so, so deeply into their stores of patience to teach all of us to separate our garbage and begin to compost. I'm certain there were many hiccups along the way, but it worked and our biannual fees did not increase because of it. Every week, I find myself amazed and proud at how much waste my family diverted from landfill.

That being said....whenever I see a note sticking out of my empty compost/garbage can, I immediately think I'm going to be scolded for improperly sorting our waste. We've never been in 'trouble' and frankly, if we were to be chastised, I'd blame my children.

PAN Disposal. I've lived in Cobble Hill for 19 years, but I'm old enough to remember being a child, growing up in the North Island and having a Dairyland milkman deliver milk to our house. It was a personal service, you knew the milkman and he gave a friendly wave as he left milk on your doorstep and headed to his next delivery. You got used to his schedule and it was just something so simple, yet taken for granted. It's how I feel about our garbage men (yikes, sorry if there is some politically correct name, it's morning and I'm a bit sleepy). We know when our garbage and/or compost will be picked up. If I drive past a truck, I give a friendly wave and get one back. Heck, I even save on the cost of postage and pay for garbage/compost collection twice a year by taping a cheque to the lid of the garbage cans.

We live in a small area. Our area is promoted as a close knit community where neighbours know neighbours and we possess a small town feel. PAN Disposal contributes to that feeling. As well, we are a family of five who manage to survive on one income and that income is derived from my self-employed husband. Our youngest needed braces. It cost us over \$9000.00. That expense, over time, was paid out of pocket. I feel that the owners of PAN Disposal can identify with my family and the struggles of running a business or being self-employed. They are residents of the CVRD and the possibility of their business being destroyed is offensive to me. They give value to our community and they work tirelessly to support their families. Why isn't a successful, community minded local business being supported in every way by the CVRD?

Haven't we gone through this before? I'm quite certain that PAN Disposal was under attack a few years ago and it was as unjustified then as it is now. I can't help but insert here that if I'm taking the time to send an email, then I'm clearly someone who takes the time to vote in every election and I will vote loudly and passionately against my current director should he choose to vote in favour of ending this local business. I've already talked to neighbours and family members and they, too, will vote against you in the next election.

I am a long term resident (30yrs) in the Shawnigan Lake area and I own multiple properties all of which receive services paid for thru taxation revenue.

I understand that the CVRD is initiating a review of the way our solid waste is handled and is looking at ways to improve and streamline things now and for the future. I further understand the Provincial Gov't has mandated the CVRD to carry out this review.

I have gone to your website and answered the survey the CVRD has presented for this review. My concern would be changing the status quo with our long standing service providers we have been enjoying for quite some time here in the Cowichan Valley.

I am referring to "Fisher Road Recycling" and "Pan Disposal". These two organizations have provided the community at large with an efficient way to organize, pickup, and dispose of all of our food scraps, organics and garbage, and other disposable / recyclable products.

The service schedule, timing and reliability of **Pan Disposal** is above reproach. They adhere to their schedule like clockwork, they communicate with the residents, they charge a reasonable fee, and they show up to work on holidays! Holidays that would see any and all municipal, provincial and CVRD workers paid to stay home. CVRD's Solid Waste Management draft document states on page 21 that the plan is to "Adopt universal curbside collection services across the region." We are strongly against the proposal that CVRD take over garbage/organics collection in Areas A, B and C. In fact, the opportunity for ticket purchase should be expanded throughout CVRD.

Paying a flat annual fee is a disincentive for households to reduce their garbage. To its credit, CVRD promoted the use of composters a few years ago by offering them for sale at a reduced price. We bought one and it has helped reduce our garbage significantly. We urge CVRD to reinstate the sale of composters again.

We have reduced our garbage collection to twice a year, using one large yellow bag each time. The last batch of 6 tickets from P.A.N. Disposal cost \$22, so our yearly total for garbage collection is only \$7.33.

If CVRD embarks on a new collection system for a flat fee, there is no incentive to reduce household garbage. When we put a ticket on each bag to be collected, we know exactly what it costs. We do not want to subsidize those who don't care how much garbage they produce. We would fight hard to be exempted from the new program, and continue our collection by the private business which now serves us so well.

I am a homeowner in subject to municipal taxes from the CVRD. Pan Disposal has been operating in this area for garbage and compost pick-up for several years and it has been a reliable and affordable service. One of the reasons I really like this service is that I ONLY pay for the garbage I put out. Our household endeavors to recycle as much as possible in order to be as environmental as possible. It is one way we can try to mitigate the terrible damage being wrought by humans on this planet. So at most, we might put out one bag of garbage per month, often only every 2 months. I want to have a choice on this. If CVRD takes over this service, can they guarantee that I will only pay \$4.00 per month for my garbage pickup? That is what my current costs are with PAN disposal.

The current "pay as you put out" offered by PAN disposal incentivizes me to recycle more. When we lived 10 years in Otter Point (outside Sooke area) – we also had a choice to have regular garbage pickup or take it to the local disposal site. We chose the latter and saved quite a bit of money.

It's all well and good that the CVRD has "meetings" for the public to express their opinion, but the only part that counts is whether they actually listen to and follow the voice of the taxpayers rather than putting their own agenda first in the queue. Good morning,

According to the CVRD's *NEW draft Solid Waste Management Plan 2018* (p. 21), one of the strategies to reduce disposal from the residential sector would be to "Adopt Universal Curbside Collection Services Across the Region", including curbside garbage and organics collection. The CVRD already collects our recyclables (blue bin collection).

As residents of **Continue**, my wife and I receive service from a private company (*PAN Disposal*) which already collects our garbage and organics. We wish to express our desire to <u>continue</u> receiving these services from *PAN Disposal* for the following reasons:

1. PAN Disposal has been a reliable family-owned company that has diligently collected these two items in the region for years. They have proven their reliability by collecting, without fail, our garbage and organics every Monday, even on public holidays. If handed over to the CVRD, collection would likely change and certainly wouldn't occur on public holidays. In fact, it would be deferred to the following day, which would create confusion that doesn't presently exist. Why try to fix a system that is definitely not broken? We are **very satisfied** with PAN Disposal's services as they are.

2. PAN Disposal also has a "zero-waste, zero bill" policy. In fact, if we choose to compost our organic waste in our backyard, we don't have to pay to have it collected by PAN. If we so choose, we can purchase individual tickets to stick to our organic green bin as needed. The same goes for our garbage. If we manage to throw a minimum amount out, we may choose to only put out our garbage <u>once a month</u> by, once again, using a ticket on our garbage can. This can reduce the cost of our collection bill. This system effectively encourages us to compost more and use (as often as possible) our nearest recycling centre on Fisher Road, therefore creating less waste in the landfill.

3. PAN Disposal has kept its operating costs as low as possible. Since 2016, the cost of collection has risen by 7% (\$ 102.41 in 2016 compared to \$ 109.58 in 2018). Conversely, our CVRD property taxes have risen by 18% in the same span of time (\$ 2,760.91 in 2016 compared to \$ 3,253.33 in 2018). You may say that our property taxes don't include roadside recycling collection ... but who is to say the increase in collection costs couldn't be "blended" with our property taxes in the future? With PAN, the cost is clearly stated and remains the cost for services rendered. In the CVRD's case, the costs could easily be included in the yearly pie chart distributed with property tax increases, which is nebulous at best.

Subject: Proposal to change from private garbage collection to CVRD collection

I am currently customer of Pan Disposal. My wife and I have only lived in **Control of** for a year and we find their service to be cost effective and reliable. We previously lived in Lillooet and waste disposal came under the jurisdiction of the SLRD but was collected by Lillooet regional district and paid for through a separate utility fee but initially was collected through property taxes. The fees initially were reasonable but over time became very costly, particularly for those trying to be environmentally responsible. Each household was allowed 2 containers which were collected weekly. Responsible people would take their recyclables to the depot while others would just put the recycling in the garbage. I recycled and put out less than 1 container monthly. The injustice in the system was the fact that I was charged the same as the person who did not recycle. This is the glaring problem with a tax or yearly utility fee system. With a user pay system, you pay for what you use. I currently pay for pick up on average 1 container per month and all the recyclables are collected by the CVRD or taken to Fischer road depot (styrofoam, plastic bags, glass bottles etc).

With a flat fee, what is the incentive to take those items for recycle and not put them in the garbage. Dumps are costly and fill up fast when recyclables are added to the garbage.

Having only been in the area a short time, my wife and I have been happy with the service and cost of the garbage collection done by Pan Disposal.

They collect by weight, which considerably reduces the amount of waste entering the landfill; people are mindful if it saves them the extra cost. They started the organics program many years ago, and have put countless amount of time, effort and education into their program in order to keep organics, recycling, glass, etc, out of the landfill.

We attended the CVRD Meeting in Cobble Hill, on September 11th. It was not advertised very well and not enough notice was given. Althought it was well-attended, so many more people would have been there. Summertime residents also missed out. We were surprised that only one of the Area Directors was present. We were told that the other two were unable to attend, due to an inportant conference. The presentation was very well done, but from the view point of the consulting firm, with little imput from the CVRD staff present. However, we cannot agree more with reduction of waste going to the landfill; this made us think, that the focus should first be on the industrial and commercial sector, as well as communities who do not have a service provider. Also, the illegal dumping issue is everything but household organics and garbage. Perhaps a facility, like in Victoria, where people can drop, off at no cost, building and reno material, furniture, etc. Mandating will not solve this issue; illegal dumping is a mind-set!

Electoral areas C, A and B are fortunate to have the Fisher Road facility and an established household collection service provider, PAN Disposal, already in place; we do not need or wish for the CVRD proposed mandated service.

Based on our experiences in Victoria, we do find that the easiest way to mess up a service is to allow the government to control it.

It has come to our attention, as homeowners in Area C – Cobble Hill, that the CVRD is going through a Provincially required Waste Management Plan review. It has also come to our attention through the press, resident emails and Pan Disposal that there is a possibility this could lead to a change in how our garbage/compost is handled.

We would like to send a letter of support and satisfaction regarding our current service provider PAN Disposal.

We have lived in our home since 1981. PAN has been taking care of our waste since that time. It is a family run business which has spent money to develop new options with the changing times. They pick up compost every week and household garbage every other week. This works extremely well for us. We particularly love the weekly compost pick up. This assists in keeping rodents down in the area by not having to use outdoor compost bins. I know people in other areas that the CVRD services who do not receive compost pick up at all. We would be extremely concerned to lose this service.

While we choose to pay bi-yearly for the consistency of our pick-ups, PAN also offers a "by the can" service which is a great option for occasional or light users. Our pick up day is Monday, and even though there are many stat holidays on a Monday, the company still picks up. We don't have to keep track of an awkward "skip a day" calendar. If the CVRD or other operator were to take over this service I believe we will lose the variety of options PAN has worked so hard to give us.

We have been customers of this company for over 30 years and have never had a complaint or a problem with their service. Taking business away from a private company that is employing people and paying taxes to add another level of bureaucracy to the CVRD is not only fiscally irresponsible but just wrong on many levels. Having said that, the main complaint that we have, is that as people who take "garbage" very seriously and work diligently to keep it to a minimum, we will end up subsidising those who simply throw everything away. With the sticker system from PAN we find that we put a garbage can out every 6 to 8 weeks costing us approximately \$3.50 each time. Can you tell us that we will pay less for this service provided by the CVRD? Can you just imagine what will end up in the garbage if "we have to pay for it anyway?"

To Whom It May Concern,

I am writing in regard to the CVRD yet again trying to take over Pan Disposal garbage/recycling service. I was a customer of Pan Disposal when the CVRD took the recycle away from them in Cowichan Bay. This is what I found happened. With Pan Disposal I could put out as much recycle material as I had and it was all removed on pick up day. With the CVRD only the one container is emptied. This means I now spend my time and gas money to take the remaining materials to a recycle place. I enquired as to a bigger container and found out it would be a \$100 fee to replace what I have. So for a higher fee with CVRD I now get less service.

I am concerned with the garbage pick up as it will be the same frame work of one container only picked up by someone sitting in a truck pushing a button. With Pan Disposal I found out that sometimes I put very little or no garbage out and other times had a heavier can that I should put out. In talking with the owner he felt that because it was not a consistently over the allowed amount, that is, sometimes I put out nothing, that it balanced out over time. With the CVRD I know that I will once again be paying to haul my own over flow away when the current Pan service is completely adequate.

Pan Disposal also comes regularly on Mondays which is my area day for pick up. The CVRD does not pick up on Stat holidays as Pan does. From living in Cowichan Bay this means I will get one day a month for garbage pick up. There was little to no communication as to whether there would be an alternate day for pick up regarding the holiday schedule. I had even received a schedule for the wrong area in the mail when they were updating the schedule. Once again this would mean less service for more money than what I now have. I will have to haul my garbage at my own expense and time to make up for this.

What really disturbs me is that Pan Disposal is a family business. They have young children to support. Why would the CVRD insist on putting them out of business when they live in the area, raise their families, and pay taxes to the CVRD whose is behind this take over. I guess that one can feel "comfortable" with a secure job to empire build in this way. When the existing service is the better than what the CVRD replaces it with, why would anyone want to force it out of business for a lesser service? More money for less service is not acceptable.

Our area has a significant population of seniors living on a fixed income. I believe that the CVRD will not only provide LESS service, but at a higher cost than we get currently.

In summation;

PAN Disposal is a private sector company that provides a quality service for the people of the Cowichan Valley. The CVRD should keep it's bureaucratic fingers off this much valued service.

Statement from the Chair re: draft Solid Waste Management Plan

Duncan, BC – In response to concerns raised by members of the public regarding the Cowichan Valley Regional District's draft Solid Waste Management Plan, the Chair of the CVRD Board of Directors issued the following statement:

"We have heard concerns in the community that the proposed recommendations in the draft Solid Waste Management Plan will lead to the closure of a local disposal company that serves residents in the south end of the region. There is nothing in the draft Plan to suggest that any company will be put out of business.

The draft Plan, as required by the BC Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy, provides a series of recommendations to help address serious waste management issues within the region. One of those recommendations is to extend curbside collection of garbage and organics to all households. Known as 'universal service', this model is shown to reduce the amount of garbage produced by individual households, and is a proven tool for managing the amount of waste that gets shipped to landfill, and the cost to taxpayers for that shipment. There is no determination within the Plan that specifies who will provide the service. If the draft Plan is approved by the CVRD Board, a business case will be prepared to determine the most efficient and cost-effective model for service delivery. All findings will be presented to the Board and any recommendations will be in keeping with the CVRD Purchasing Policy.

More than 30% of the region's garbage is food waste and compostable material, and Electoral Areas have one of the highest recycling contamination rates in the Province. These, along with illegal dumping and garbage burning, are some of the important issues identified by the Plan Advisory Committee (PAC) during the Solid Waste Management Plan amendment process. Ensuring that all homes in the region have access to, and participate in, responsible methods for disposing of compostable organics, recyclables, and garbage at the curbside is a key strategy for addressing these issues and is one of thirteen recommendations put forward by the PAC.

The draft Plan is out for public comment until September 14 and we absolutely encourage residents to read the thirteen recommendations within the Plan and provide us with their written comments on how waste and recycling can be managed over the next 10 years. We also encourage residents to attend open houses, to talk to staff and PAC members about the draft Plan and the process for developing the recommendations."

ABOUT THE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN:

1.) Why is the CVRD updating (amending) the Solid Waste Management Plan?

The Province of BC requires regional districts to update Solid Waste Management Plans every 10 years. The CVRD's Plan was last updated in 2006, and is due for amendment to ensure that it continues to reflect the region's goals and objectives for management of municipal solid waste.

2.) What's being proposed?

The CVRD's per capita waste disposal rate is currently 358 kg per year. Waste audits show that more than 30% of the garbage sent to landfill is food waste and compostable material. Another 15% of the garbage is plastics, paper, and other recyclables. The draft Plan presents new waste reduction targets along with thirteen strategies to help meet those targets by reducing the amount of food, and recyclables, in the waste stream. The strategies also address important issues including illegal dumping, education, asset management, and disaster preparedness.

3.) How much will it cost? Will my taxes go up?

The thirteen strategies proposed in the draft Plan will cost between \$173,722 and \$518,423 per year. A detailed budget is provided in the draft Plan. These costs will be shared amongst all residents in Electoral Areas and municipalities and will be reflected in annual property tax notices. Estimated tax increases will be between \$0.88 and \$2.62 per year, per \$100,000 of assessed value for residential homes. Adoption of universal curbside collection in all Electoral Areas is estimated to cost approximately \$2.7M per year. Curbside collection is a user pay system and the program is funded through the collection of annual utility bills and is not funded by taxation.

4.) What is "universal" curbside collection?

Universal curbside collection means that all households in the region will have access to, and will participate in, the same curbside collection model for food waste (organics), recycling, and garbage. At this time, more than 20,000 residents are not required to participate in curbside garbage collection programs, and more than 33,000 residents don't have mandatory curbside organics collection.

5.) Is the CVRD taking over curbside collection services?

One of thirteen strategies proposed in the draft Plan is to extend curbside collection of garbage and organics to all households in Electoral Areas. Known as 'universal service', this model is shown to reduce the amount of garbage produced by individual households, and is an important tool for managing the amount of waste that gets shipped to landfill, as well as for controlling illegal dumping and burning of garbage. The draft Plan does not contemplate who will provide the service (CVRD or private sector). If the draft Plan is approved by the CVRD Board, a business case will be prepared to determine the most efficient and cost-effective model for service delivery. All findings will be presented to the Board.

6.) Will the Plan put Fisher Road Recycling out of business?

The draft Plan acknowledges the importance of working with the private sector in South Cowichan to ensure adequate service delivery to residents in Electoral Areas A, B and C. At this time, the private sector provides a range of services to the community, and the CVRD has partnered with Fisher Road Recycling to provide free drop-off for packaging and printed paper for South Cowichan residents. The draft Plan does not propose any changes to this service model, but does

recommend that service levels continue to be monitored to ensure that South Cowichan residents have access to the same range and types of drop-off services that provided in all other parts of the region.

7.) Will the Plan put PAN Disposal out of business?

The draft Plan does not contemplate service delivery. The thirteen strategies provided within the Plan are high-level planning recommendations designed to help the region reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and manage municipal solid waste in a responsible and effective way. Implementation of each strategy will rely on a combination of tools and services provided by both the public, private and non-profit sectors. If the draft Plan is approved by the CVRD Board, then a business case will be prepared to determine the most efficient and cost-effective model for service delivery for universal curbside service.

8.) How was the draft Plan developed?

A Plan Advisory Committee consisting of 16 representatives from local waste businesses, institutions, governments, First Nations, non-profits, CVRD staff, and the public has been meeting since March 2018 to review the waste management system, identify gaps and areas for improvement, and develop a set of guiding principles and regional waste reduction targets. The PAC is recommending 13 strategies for adoption in the draft Solid Waste Management Plan.

9.) How can I provide comments?

The draft Plan is out for public consultation until September 14, 2018. Two open houses have already been held and two more are scheduled in coming weeks. A survey is available online until September 14. Residents can also email their comments directly to es@cvrd.bc.ca.

All comments received during the consultation period will be compiled in a Public Consultation Report which will be presented to the Plan Advisory Committee for consideration in finalization of the Solid Waste Management Plan. The final Plan, and public consultation report, will then be presented to the CVRD Board in October 2018, before being forwarded to the BC Minister of Environment for approval.

Grant Funding Provides for a New Sewer Service in Cobble Hill

CVRD

The CVRD is proposing to combine the Twin Cedars and Cobble Hill sewer system service areas into a new sewer system service area. Costs to taxpayers for the new service area (Cobble Hill Village Sewer System Service Area) would be recovered by a combination of a parcel tax and user fees. The estimated annual cost to residential property owners within the proposed service area would be approximately \$900 per unit, per annum. In order to proceed the CVRD needs to obtain public approval through an Alternative Approval Process (AAP).

The proposed new service bylaw has received three readings, and the Province has approved moving forward. Electors (residents and non-residents) of the service area have the opportunity to complete an *Elector Response Form* if they are opposed to the proposal. Forms must be returned to the CVRD by 4:30 p.m., Thursday, September 20, 2018. If more than 29 (10% of 285) electors in the proposed service area are opposed to this proposal the CVRD will be unable to adopt the bylaw, unless a referendum is held.

If you are in favour of the proposal, no action is required.

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Harmonizing Electoral Area Official Community Plans

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In addition, the harmonization project will reduce the size of the exiting OCPs by about 50%, removing repetitive and sometimes conflicting objectives and policies that unnecessarily clutter and complicate the planning process. The outcome of this administrative exercise will be a single, stream-lined OCP document for all CVRD electoral areas with complementary local area plans for village areas focussing on the particular character of each area. The project also includes harmonizing the CVRD's eight zoning bylaws into a single integrated bylaw to complement and



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implement the policies contained with the harmonized OCP.

A steering committee, comprised of the Chairs from each Electoral Area Advisory Planning Commission, has been established to help work through the review process by providing oversight with respect to harmonized policies, land use designations, development permits, etc. it is anticipated that the first draft with be completed by early 2019.

This work reflects the vision set out within the Cowichan 2050 project by improving the coordination and collaboration in land use planning within the region.

Duncan, BC – The Cowichan Valley Regional District recently completed a new draft Solid Waste Management Plan and will be seeking community input in the coming weeks. The Plan sets out new waste reduction targets for the region and proposes strategies for managing municipal solid waste over the next 10 years, with a long-term vision of 25 years. Residents will have opportunities to provide input at a series of community open houses, an online survey and on PlaceSpeak. CVRD staff will also be attending community events in coming weeks to raise awareness and receive feedback on the draft Plan.
